2023/2024 -1ST Semester Visual Culture — TP1 Dr. Paula Horta

Syllabus

This course focuses on the visual experience, as it shapes our sense of identity, history and social relations. As such, it is geared toward building a toolbox through which students can 1) explore theoretical approaches to the study of Visual Culture; 2) outline the historical and sociocultural context of the production, circulation and reception of visual representations; 3) develop critical visual literacy, which may be understood as the development of critical inquiry and thinking about images and objects, as well as their means of production and dissemination; 4) examine the rhetorical dimension of visual representations and practices (painting, photography, video and digital media); 5) consider the relationship between visual and written texts.

Grading and Assessment

This course follows a continuous assessment model. Students are expected to maintain regular attendance, arrive on time, contribute to in-class discussions and activities, complete all assignments and come to class prepared to discuss the reading material(s) scheduled for that day.

Submission of Work:
